SOCIAL ROLES: A pantomime guessing game that teaches the idea of social roles within any society, and supports a Social Studies curriculum in world cultures. For older Elementary students. GIBBERISH SENTENCES: A pantomime game that explores ways to communicate without words. Can be used as a primer to more elaborate Theatre Games, or to support a Social Studies curriculum about immigrants. For older Elementary and up. THE DISCOVERY OF FIRE: An improvised scene about early humans. For older Elementary and up. RITUALS: Students create their own magical rituals while exploring the importance of ritual to early (and modern) cultures. For older Elementary and up.
